Rethinking

- Who are 'young people'?
- What kinds of drug offences are young people committing?
- How does the justice system currently respond to these young people?
- Should we be responding differently?



Redefining 'Youth'

- The Criminal Justice System treats 'young people' and 'adults' differently
- The Youth Justice System reflects that adolescents are in a specific stage of development
- "A key to reducing crime is to stop young people entering the court and justice system in the first place" – Justice Minister Judith Collins
- JustSpeak believe that 17 year olds should not be treated as adults by the Criminal Justice System



Rethinking Drug Offending

- Illicit drug offences make up 4% of all youth offending
- 97% are cannabis-related offences.
- The number of young people apprehended for drug possession and/or use has decreased slightly over the last 20 years

BUT

- The rate of drug possession apprehensions leading to prosecution has almost doubled
- What's changed?




What's changed?

Police discretion.

This is the proportion of drugs possession apprehensions of 10- to 16-year-olds leading to prosecution

The rate has almost doubled since 1994 while warnings have decreased



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

Reviewing Current Approaches

- Drug and alcohol abuse and/or addiction is one of the most frequent motivators for offending across the board
 - In 2011, 80% of all young people who appeared before the courts had
 substance abuse issues
 - 0.6% received orders from the Judge for treatment programmes
- One size does not fit all young people offend in the context of their families and communities
- (Re)habilitation is complex
